Signs of Heat stroke

- * Excessive Panting
- * Excessive Salivating or Foaming
- * Difficulty in breathing
- * Vomiting
- * Dehydration
- * Depression, lethargic (acting drunk)
- * Shock
- * Seizure ,Collapse, or coma



First Aid For Heat stroke

- ◆The objective is to cool your pet down as fast as possible to bring the body temperature down back to normal.
- ◆Get your animal out of the car or out of direct heat and bring to a cool shaded area.
- ◆Hose down the animal with cool water. Use and find anything you can to wet your pet.
- ◆ Place water soaked towels on head, neck, feet chest and abdomen.
- ◆ If you have air conditioning in the car place animal in car with air conditioning on high and **drive straight to your veterinarian.**
